The following is information on how my Fall Term (Michaelmas Term) went.

SCC.111: Software Development - Full Year Only, 5 US credits, 10 ECTS credits

Course Description: Software now forms a central aspect of our lives. From the applications we run on our phones to the satellites in space, all modern technology is enabled by software. This module provides an introduction to the field of Software Development - the processes and skills associated with designing and constructing computer programs. Assuming no previous knowledge of the field, we study the contemporary knowledge, skills and techniques needed to develop high-quality computer software. This includes a thorough treatment of the principles of computer programming and how these principles can be applied using a range of contemporary and established languages such as Python, JavaScript and C. We discover how programming languages can be classified and how to choose the best language for the task at hand.

- **Lecture(s):** There are 2 lectures, each 1 hour long.
- Lab(s): 1 combined lab that is 2 hours long. This is a combined lab for students in SCC.111 and SCC.121

Assessment Proportions:

- Coursework is worth 30% of your grade. Assessed quiz worth 5% of the total mark and contain content from modules SCC.111 and SCC.121
- Exam is worth 70% of your grade.

SCC.121: Fundamentals of Computer Science - Full Year Only, 5 US credits, 10 ECTS credits

Course Description: Computing and data drive many critical elements of modern society, directly or indirectly. It's vital that there is a strong theoretical foundation to Computer Science. This module begins by examining the hard questions central to Computer Science and reasoning itself to prepare you for the in-depth critical thinking and discussion required at university level. It then proceeds to cover the fundamentals in logic, sets, and mathematics which have practical applications in software such as computer graphics. Algorithms, abstract data types, and analysis of algorithms is introduced to allow you to make reasoned decisions about the design of your programs. Finally, we investigate and apply the principles of Data Science and examine the way programs and systems can be designed to efficiently support work with data and question the limits of conclusions that can be drawn from such systems.

- **Lecture(s):** There are 2 lectures, each 1 hour long.
- Lab(s): 1 combined lab that is 2 hours long. This is a combined lab for students in SCC.111 and SCC.121

- Coursework is worth 30% of your grade. Assessed quiz worth 5% of the total mark and contain content from modules SCC.111 and SCC.121
- Exam is worth 70% of your grade.

ENSI222: Skills for Entrepreneurship - Michaelmas Term Only, 4 US credits, 7.5 ECTS credits

Course Description: This course provides a critical introduction to key concepts to facilitate a broad understanding and application of developing and selling a new product through an interactive and socialized lens. It is targeted at students on business-related degrees and in particular those undertaking the Business and Management (Entrepreneurship) specialism. It provides a broad and holistic view of the entrepreneurial process and focuses on the agency and activities of the entrepreneur as the main driver of new products and businesses.

Class Hours:

- Lecture(s): There is 1 lecture, that's a 1 hour long.
- Workshop(s): (AKA DGDs) 1 workshop, that's also a 1 hour long.

Assessment Proportions:

- Coursework assignment will be taken towards the end of the course. This will comprise of a detailed analysis of a new product case study using the concepts from the module. (70% of final grade)
- Groups will be assessed on video presentations developed as part of workshop topics and activities. This will allow them to explain as groups their particular product and the development processes they undertook. (30% of final grade)

- I bought a small instant pot from amazon and just cook at home.

- The train is the best way to travel. If you are planning to travel by train, get a rail card (£30 for a year \rightarrow 1/3 off train tickets for anyone age 16-25)
- Download Trainline. You can buy tickets from the app and use/buy rail card from the app too.

I did not purchase any textbooks. Most can be found online for free. My entrepreneur course has articles as reading material, which is uploaded by the professor. PowerPoint and sometimes lecture recording are also provided.

wait a long time for their passport to come back, which is why I tried to submit as fast as possible, but my passport came back after a week.

Other comments or recommendations.

Bussing

Usually, £2 per bus ride so £4 for the whole trip. The charge changes to £1 around 10pm or 11pm (not like OC Transpo where one ticket can be used within a selected amount of time)

You enter the bus and say, "one ticket to town" or "one ticket to uni".

- 1 or 1A bus is the fastest bus to get to town (20 mins)
- 100 bus goes around the neighborhood and then go to town (30 mins)
- Last bus is 3:30 AM, incase you decide to stay in town late.
 - You can get a taxi or call an Uber (not the popular option though)

Shopping

To tour around town (or shop) get off at "Common Garden," that's where most of the stores you will regularly go to are. Some suggestions ...

- Primark: Cheap clothes but also sometimes good quality // it is like Urban Planets (Bayshore)
- T.K Max: Clothing and home stuff // it's like Winners // it's more expensive than Primark.
- Poundland: like Dollar store

Using my Lancaster email, I set up an amazon prime account (6-month fast delivery). Delivery goes to the porter, and you will receive an email when it is ready for pick up. (located on the left of Fylde bar)

Groceries

- Online order from ASDA
 - o ASDA has good prices but it's far by bus. Delivery chargers range from 1-4 pounds.
- Sainsbury (take the 1A and get off at Lancaster Cable St)
 - o I did my first groceries here and bought a plate, dish, and cup. For 26 items I paid £56.
- SPAR (in campus)
 - o I usually get milk and snacks from there. Not the greatest option but definitely convenient
- Student Union Shop
 - o Most students get their alcohol from here.

Mobile Sim

Get your Sim card from VOXI, super cheap and worth it. I am paying £15 for 105 GB, unlimited text and calling. VOKI uses the same network as Vodafone, which is a well-known service provider but expensive. Another option is O2, which I hear good things about.

However, I suggest you ask any of the people you meet what sim card they would suggest and are using (that is how I found out about VOXI).

Banking

I don't recommend getting a bank account because setting it up and then closing it is such a big hassle.

I recommend setting up a WISE account and ordering yourself a WISE debit card (free). Use that everywhere you go and use it to e-transfer whenever you have it to. Super easy to set up and use, and it's used by students here too.
